The newly revamped greenhouse behind the GYSTC building on the BC campus will now house assorted plants to prepare for delivery to area nursing home residents.

The BC Greenhouse Project took root when BC Vice-President of Student Affairs Dr. Patricia Green-

Powell, Director of Plant Operations Leonard Dean, and Instructor of Biology Wilbert Butler were discussing ideas to rejuvenate the campus greenhouse.

"Mr. Butler joined forces with Mr. Dean to not only organize plants, but make the greenhouse safe and durable," commented Dr. Green-Powell.

"I had no idea that I would be working with such a fine biologist/chemist such as Wilbert Butler. He was given a task and has strategi-

cally planned when we should expect our first group of florals to make arrangements."

Butler originally advised a similar program when he worked as a biology teacher at Havana Northside High School. "Although most of our volunteers are from the biology and anatomy and physiology classes, I hope to see more students, especially those in non-science related majors, get involved in this new program since we are always looking for volunteers," Butler said.

"I am very excited about the service learning component of the greenhouse," noted Dr. Green-Powell. "We will be putting students from academic classes in touch with the community, by touching lives through plants."

## SUMMER ENROLLMENT UP

Summer student enrollment at Bainbridge College surpassed expectations and other schools.

According to the Board of Regents, the summer 2002 enrollment increased by 50% and the number of full-time enrolled (FTE) increased by 63.7% over the previous summer term. Summer 2001 enrollment recorded 834 registrations while summer 2002 noted 1252 registrations.

These increases exceed the percentages posted by the state two-year, state colleges, state, regional, and re-

search universities.

"We knew enrollment had increased significantly in the summer session," said Clifford Brock, president of Bainbridge College, "but we did not know we had increased so much more than any other school in the University System of Georgia."

Several factors contributed to the increase including the addition of new career programs, greater outreach, and the recent tuition increase at four year schools in Georgia.
